Montreal Gazette (1778–2010)

The *Montreal Gazette* is Montreal's only surviving English-language newspaper, as well as the oldest daily still in print in all of Canada. Originally founded as *The Gazette*, the paper offers much insight into Canadian history in the late 19th Century as well as important coverage of international, national, provincial, and local events. Coverage includes past events of current historical landmarks such as the Notre-Dame Basilica of Montreal, Saint Joseph's Oratory of Mount Royal, and the Old Port of Montreal. The paper gives insight into the commercial, social, and cultural life of the future city of Montreal via the large number of business and professional cards, the advertisements, and notices of local organizations. The *Montreal Gazette* is also home to several National Newspaper Award-winning editorial writers including Edgar A. Collard's chronicle of the history of Montreal, Henry Aubin's groundbreaking environmental investigations, and award-winning editorial cartoonist "Aislin" (Terry Mosher).

NOTE: During the inaugural year of this title's publication, (June 3, 1778–June 2, 1779) content is presented in French. After this first year of publication, the publishers were arrested and the title discontinued. In 1785, one of the original publishers started up the paper again (under the title's current name), and the content between August 25, 1785–June 24, 1816 is presented in both French and English. After that point, the content is presented in English only.

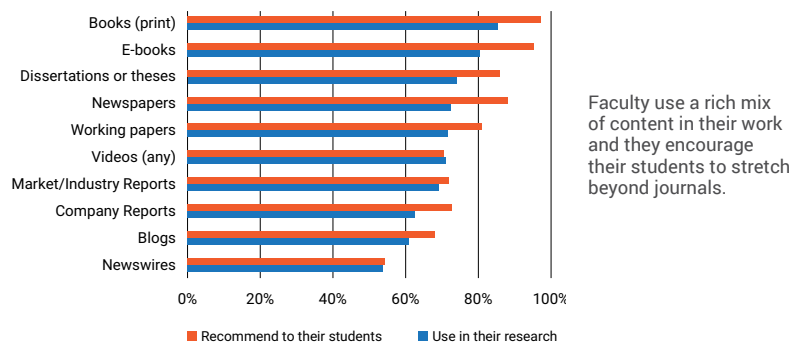
