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Describe your educational background.

In addition to my MLIS degree, I also hold an MA and PhD in Modern Latin American History.

What was your path to librarianship like?

Unexpected...I had earned my MLIS degree as a backup to what I thought was going to be a career researching and teaching modern Latin American history. I soured on this career choice during my first 3 years in the history doctorate program and found, as well, that I was making a bigger difference as a librarian than I would have as a future history professor. I am glad I had the support of many people to see me finish my PhD, but I honestly value my MLIS degree.

Tell us about a recent professional achievement of which you are particularly proud.

It's not recent per se but I was part of the 2012 I Love My Librarian Award cohort hosted by Carnegie Corporation of New York and the ALA. Being nominated and winning that award encourages me to surpass myself professionally on a daily basis.

The starting point!

What are some of the most useful resources for selecting core books in your discipline?

Choice Reviews, Books in Print, and frequent interactions with graduate students and associated faculty advisors. These resources allow me to know what's been, what is, and what to expect in the publishing pipeline for my assigned subjects areas.

What is the biggest challenge for you in maintaining the RCL subject collection?

The increasing number of, what seem to me, vanity publishing presses and attractive titles and subject areas that really excite but are disappointing to discover that the editing and scholarship fail to meet expectations.

The Devil's Highway: A True Story. In this work, Luis Alberto Urrea conveys the complexity, absurdity and subsequent human costs associated with past and present U.S. border policy.
