Describe your educational background.

I have a BA in Dance History and Criticism/Performance and Choreography, an MA in Choreography, Aesthetics, and Archives (Dance Studies), and a PhD in Dance Studies and Artificial Intelligence.

What was your path to librarianship like?

While teaching in the dance department at Brenau University in Georgia, I worked with the librarian to develop 'treasure hunts' in the library for my students. Dance students are generally thought of as living in studios and on stages, but they need to learn of theory and history, too. Also, while working on my doctoral research I was in constant contact with librarians and I spent time working with metadata issues, etc. The Brenau librarian told me I was a closet librarian, and told me of the CLIR Post-doctoral Fellowship. I applied, and ended up spending a year at the University of Virginia and another at the University of North Carolina - Greensboro. Between the two I learned about reference librarianship, building online collections, collections management, admin and budgetary considerations, facilities management, etc.

Tell us about a recent professional achievement of which you are particularly proud.

Processing a collection in the SCPA archives; building a gallery exhibit on those materials in the SCPA archives, and planning a symposium highlighting the Irmgard Bartenieff Papers. I also continue to present dance as a valid part of the digital humanities at conferences (most recently demonstrating work within the archives!)

Describe RCL in three words.

Metadata, Guru, Necessary

What are some of the most useful resources for selecting core books in your discipline? Colleagues in the dance discipline (I often reach out and they are more than willing to offer suggestions).

What is the biggest challenge for you in maintaining the RCL subject collection? Culling (weeding). I think all texts re: dance are important!
